Purpose

The pupil premium is additional funding for publicly funded schools in England. It's designed to help disadvantaged pupils of all abilities perform better, and close the gap between them and their peers.



Principles

Within the Moorlands Primary Federation, we ensure that teaching and learning opportunities meet the needs of all pupils. Provision is made for any pupil presented with a barrier to learning, to enable them to develop strategies, perseverance and confidence in themselves and their abilities.

In making provision for socially disadvantaged pupils, we recognise that not all pupils who are eligible for free school meals (or have been eligible in the last six years) are socially disadvantaged, or that some children who experience disadvantaged backgrounds are not eligible for free school meals and therefore don't qualify for Pupil Premium Funding. We will ensure that each child with additional needs is provided with the highest quality of personalised provision to enable them to thrive as an individual, regardless of their status as disadvantaged or non-disadvantaged.

The Pupil Premium Funding will be allocated to supporting the learning of the disadvantaged pupils within the school, whether this is individually or within a small targeted group.

Provision

The range of provision the Trust Board and Leadership many consider making for this group could include:

- Providing small group work with an experienced teacher or Learning Support Assistant (LSA) focused on overcoming the gaps in learning.
- One-to-one support.
- Additional learning opportunities provided by teachers, LSAs or external agencies.
- Paying or subsidising activities that broaden the knowledge of the curriculum or participation in school activities.

• Supporting the Most-Able disadvantaged pupils to make minimum levels of progress, achieve age-related, or above expectations.

Our core principle when deciding upon using Pupil Premium funding will be aimed at <u>ensuring equality</u>, <u>improving achievement</u> and <u>pupil outcomes</u>.

Looked After Children (LAC)

The funding for pupils who are looked after by a local authority, and attract the £2,300 rate, is managed by the <u>virtual school head</u> of the local authority that looks after the pupil – see <u>https://www.gov.uk/guidance/pupil-premium-information-for-schools-and-alternative-provision-settings</u>. The Moorlands Primary Federation receives £500 per LAC per term from Staffordshire Local Authority.
