Make predictions about a story


- Look at the *Front Cover* of Mufaro's Beautiful Daughters.

Nyasha was sad that Manyara felt this way, but she ignored her sister's words and went about her chores.



'The firs'-years, Professor McGonagall,' said Hagrid. 'Thank you, Hagrid. I will take them from here.'




