SEPTEMBER PLANS

The team are really excited to see all of the children together once again and have been missing them greatly. START AND FINISH TIMES...AND WHICH GATE TO USE

Our current Covid-19 control measures include staggered start and finish times and the use of two entrances. This is to reduce contact between groups.

Reception (car park entrance) start: 9.00-9.10am; finish: 3.10-3.15pm **Year 1** (car park entrance) start: 8.40-8.45am; finish: 2.50-2.55pm **Year 2** (car park entrance) start: 8.50-8.55am; finish: 3.00-3.05pm

Year 3 (front of school entrance) start: 8.40-8.45am: finish: 2.50-2.55pm
Years 4/5 (front of school entrance) start: 8.50-8.55am; finish: 3.00-3.05pm
Year 6 (front of school entrance) start: 9.00-9.05am; finish: 3.10-3.15pm

Please, please ensure that you follow the timings and gates stated above - they are in place to keep children, parents/carers, and staff safe, which is something we all want.

If your child has brothers or sisters in other classes, you may bring (and collect them) at the earliest time for one of the classes e.g. if you have a child in Year 1 and Year 5, they can both follow the plans for the Year 1 and the elder child will come to this gate too. Please note that these arrangements should not be swapped within the day i.e. children should not arrive at Y1 time and leave at Y5 time. There will be no access to the front of school via the carpark.

To stay safe when coming to school, please follow the one-way system, maintain social distancing, and tempting as it may be to have a chat with other parents/ carers whom you may not have seen for a while, please make your way off the drive/path once you have dropped-off or collected.

Children will be met by staff at the playground gate indicated above. Parents/carers are not able to pass beyond these, nor enter the school site at this time. If you need to speak to a member of the team, please telephone, or email, and if we are not available at that time, we will call you back.

WHAT CAN BE BROUGHT INTO SCHOOL?

These can be brought into school:

PE kit in a separate bag (to leave in school). Lunch (unless having a school meal); healthy snack; drink bottle (containing water); returned reading/homework book (on specified days only); coat; optional small bottle of hand-sanitiser (parents must show children how to use this safely and responsibly and it cannot be shared with others); and a sunhat and suncream (weather dependent). All of these (PE kit aside) must be brought-in in a labelled plastic/carrier bag only.

Unfortunately, at the moment, these <u>cannot</u> be brought into school:

School bag, pencil case, toys, teddies etc, book/magazine from home (not including school reading book), stickers/cards, any toys, mobile phones.

WILL THERE BE ASSEMBLIES AND COLLECTIVE WORSHIP?

Unfortunately, in September children will not be able to mix together in the hall for whole-school Worship or assemblies as they will remain in their groups. This also means that there will be no Praise and Celebration assemblies, or Church Services at the moment. We will, however, bring the children together for Collective Worship via online conferencing programs...which means they can also wave at one another!

HOW DO WE TALK TO SCHOOL IF GATES CANNOT BE CROSSED?

WHAT ABOUT SCHOOL UNIFORM?

Children should be wearing full school uniform from 2nd September onwards. May we also remind all that **shoes must be worn in school**, not trainers, boots, or sandals.

WILL THERE BE LUNCHES AND SNACKS?

Lunches will continue to be available and prepared onsite. Children will be eating lunch in the classroom upon our return. At the start of term, there will be no snacks available for purchase from the kitchen, nor any prepared in class in Key Stage 1. Children should bring-in their own healthy snack.

Currently, children will not be able to mix with other groups at lunch or breaktimes.

They may see one another on the playground or field on some days, but they will be in separate areas.

CAN WE USE THE CAR PARK?

Sorry, but No. Please can we remind all that the car park is still for **staff only**. As the car park entrance will be in use as a pedestrian entrance, the car park will also be closed to vehicles for a period of time both in the morning and afternoon.

KEEPING SAFE FROM COVID-19

In school, we will continue to talk to the children about the importance of washing their hands thoroughly, maintaining good hygiene, and acting in a sensible manner to reduce the spreading of any germs. Amongst other controls, we also have hand sanitiser available in each class (children are also permitted to bring this in from home), we follow a cleaning process and display lots of posters reminding children to 'Catch it, Bin it, Kill it'.

We receive regular updates from Staffordshire Local Authority; our Health and Safety partners; Public Health England; and the Department for Education, to keep us up-to-date with any processes which we need to have in place to reduce risk. All decisions which we take as a school and Trust are based upon the safety of our children, family members, staff and Trustees, and we thank you for your ongoing full support of these decisions and the reasons behind them. Any relevant advice which we receive, we will share with you. By working together and following government advice, we can minimise the risk here at our school and amongst all of our families.

Earrings and retainers are not permitted during P.E. sessions or sporting events, therefore if your child wears earrings to school they must be able to take them out themselves and it will be the responsibility of the child to look after them. We are sure you join us in not wanting your child to miss any parts of their learning.

We know many of you may be feeling a little nervous about the full return to school in September - rest assured that this is perfectly understandable. The team know that some children will be a little more nervous than others about their return and will, of course, offer plenty of support.

WHAT IF YOU OR YOUR CHILD HAVE SYMPTOMS OF COVID-19

Should your child experience any symptoms of Covid-19, <u>it is essential</u> that they remain off school until a test has been undertaken and results received. In the case of a positive test, they must remain at home for a minimum of 7 days from the date of the test. If a household member tests positive, your child must remain at home for a period of 14 days, regardless of if they are displaying any symptoms. <u>This is to keep the entire school community safe.</u> Should your child display any symptoms whilst at school, they will enter an area of isolation with a member of the school team and we will contact you to collect them immediately. Unfortunately, any positive cases in school could result in class or whole school closure.

THANK YOU

Thank you, thank you for your ongoing support of the school, the staff team, and one another during this difficult time. Undoubtedly it has been one of the most challenging periods for each of us and for a number of reasons. Being part of such a special and caring school family has been a real positive during the past few months.
